



Whose Fault Is It Anyway?

One evening as I was coming to the church, I stopped by a local park to exercise to release some stress that has been building up in me for some time. I was amazed to see the beauty that was before my eyes. How the leaves rustled and whistled in the wind; how the birds sang their songs; how the sun warmed the soil below my feet. I thought How Great is Our God. To know that He orchestrated nature to work in unison and harmony was beyond my comprehension. But to think that He created all things for us, yet we take that which He had so graciously given us and have in some ways; in many ways tainted it--we have trashed it. I think of the wars that are going on in the Middle East; the famines that have hit some of the third world countries; the crime that seems to be rampant throughout the world; the pollutants that penetrate our nostrils and ultimately our lungs and land; and yes, the shootings that have occurred in our streets, our schools, and our society as a whole.

How can a God who created such wonderful things permit such things to happen? The answer is simple. God has given us dominion over that which He has created. When we read the Genesis account, which I

believe to be literal, we find that shortly after God created the heavens and the earth, separated the night from the day, the land from the sea, and so on and so forth and after He fashioned and formed man with His very hands and breathed life into the nostrils of man, He turned that which He created over to man. He said--I give you dominion over. (The word dominion means to rule over; to govern.) God has left mankind in charge of His creation. When we begin to wonder about God in all this, maybe we should start wondering what God thinks about how we are doing in the concept of dominion. Let's quit blaming God for all the atrocities that we face and let us begin to assume some of the responsibility, if not the majority, for the way we look after, govern, rule over that which He created. Maybe then the tides of social change will occur. When we do this, and if we do this, let us focus on our contributions or lack thereof and ask the God of all creation what we need to do to change our perception and perspective about other peoples and world problems and where we may fit in to constitute change.

I would like to invite the local ecumenical ministry and members from different local congregations, staff from Church World Service (CWS), individuals from the local Somali community, and finally, staff members and volunteers from a local social service ministry, New Hope Ministries."

OREGON The 2011 Assembly of the Oregon Synod of the Lutheran Church (ELCA) passed a strong resolution calling its churches to "support and offer preventative programs addressing bullying, harassment, and other related violence, especially with higher risk populations," and to realizing the importance of attending to the "particular needs of children and the families of those with actual or perceived differences in sexual orientation or gender identity because they are especially vulnerable to verbal, physical, emotional, spiritual, psychological, and sexual abuse."

In light of this resolution, **Rev. Solveig Nilsen-Goodin, a Portland-area Lutheran leader**, writes, "Our vision is to hold an event in the Portland area that:

- lifts up bullying as a form of violence,
- increases compassion and understanding between young people affected by bullying,
- teaches skills of non-violence to employ in the face of bullying,
- offers biblical/faith resources to address violence, and build and strengthen peaceful relationships,
- Connects people to one another and people around the world who are participating in the International Day of Prayer for Peace."



AUSTRALIA "It is my experience that it is in prayer that our hearts are safe to break over the violent brokenness of our world. Paradoxically, it is only a broken heart that is open to be filled with the nonviolent power of the Holy Spirit. It is in prayer that we see our tears and the world's pain, transfigured into fierce compassion. It is here we find grace as both pardon and empowerment to answer Christ's call, to lay down our weapons of war and take up his cross in nonviolent service of the least of these.

EAST AFRICA GRIPPED BY DROUGHT AND FAMINE

Thousands of Somalis are feared dead as famine grips the eastern Horn of Africa in the worst drought since 1950. A poor rainy season again this year means that the October harvest will not yield enough food. Crop failures will put 11 million people, mostly in Somalia, Ethiopia and Kenya, at risk of malnutrition. "This is an unprecedented humanitarian crisis that deserves the attention and support of the world," said Zach Wolgemuth, associate director for Brethren Disaster Ministries. Early last week, the UN officially declared a famine in parts of southern Somalia for the first time in nearly twenty years. A food

crisis becomes a famine only when certain conditions are met – at least 20 percent of households face extreme food shortages with a limited ability to cope; acute malnutrition rates exceed 30 percent; and the death rate exceeds two persons per day per 10,000 persons. Other factors compounding the food insecurity in



Somalia include the country's anarchic government, persistent fighting, large-scale displacement, widespread poverty, and disease. Trekking on foot for weeks or months to escape the drought, thousands of displaced Somalis are pouring across the border into neighboring Kenya carrying small children and whatever possessions they can manage. Some of the mothers arrive with dead infants in their arms. The Church of the Brethren has released \$40,000 from the Emergency Disaster Fund to support the relief efforts of international partner Church World Service (CWS). According to an appeal released by CWS on July 21, 2011, the agency is focusing work on both immediate relief and longer-term food security and water initiatives. Work is focused in Kenya, Somalia and Ethiopia. District Conference Report. July 29-31

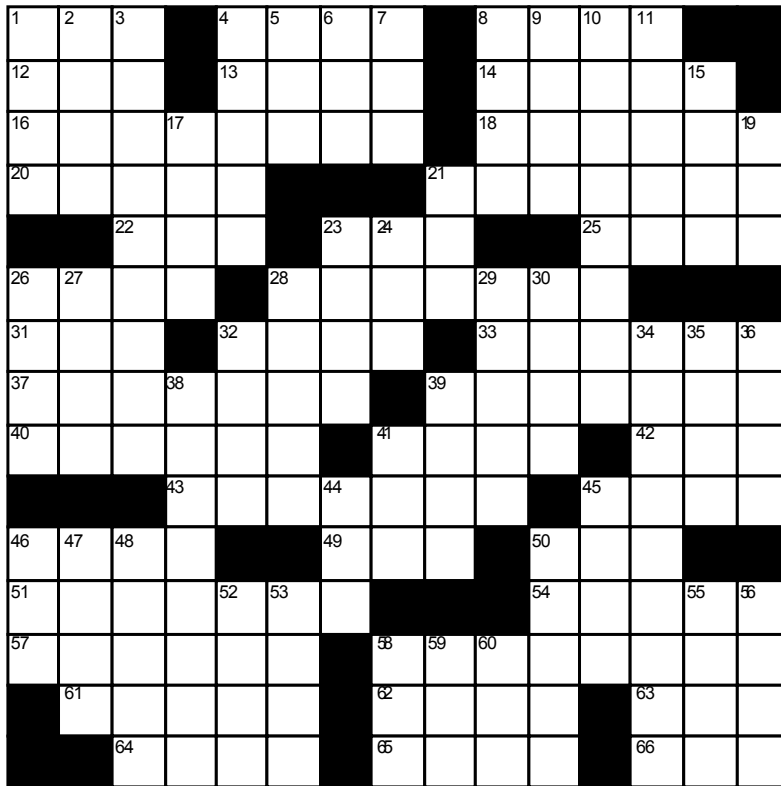
